Growing Together!

What a fabulous first trimester we have had here at Woodcrest! Students are learning and growing daily in so many ways. As I walk through classrooms I see hands-on science, collaborative math discussions, close reading of text materials, and lots of technology integrated throughout. Thank you for coming and hearing about your child's progress at Parent-Teacher Conferences last week.

Our landscape is growing as well. We are getting some irrigation issues repaired which has helped our field and some planters begin to green up again. Each grade level has now adopted a planter on campus and will be discussing what to plant and how to maintain it. Watch for a flyer about a Woodcrest Weekend Work Party where families can come and help to prepare the planters and beautify our campus.

The landscaping project at the front of the school is continuing. There will be a drip system and new plants installed, and possibly a decorative fence along the sidewalk on Washington and Krameria. We will keep you posted. Watch for the new plants in the next couple of weeks!

Thank to the passage of Measure O, we are looking at ways to increase the parking for Woodcrest. Various options have been discussed and are being considered. We know it is a challenge out there, so please be as patient and as careful as you can in the interest of safety for all of our students.

Attendance Counts!

One of the best things you can do to influence your student's academic success is to get him/her to school every day and on time. Read the following information from "AbsencesAddUp.org" for some key reasons why.

Encouraging regular school attendance is one of the most powerful ways you can prepare your child for success-both in school and in life. When you make school attendance a priority, you help your child get better grades, develop healthy life habits, avoid dangerous behavior and have a better chance of graduating from high school.

When students are absent for fewer days, their grades and reading skills often improve-even among those students who are struggling in school. Students who attend school regularly also feel more connected to their community, develop important social skills and friendships, and are significantly more likely to graduate from high school, setting them up for a strong future.

But when kids are absent for an average of just two days of school per month-even when the absences are excused- it can have a negative impact. These absences can affect kids as early as Kindergarten.

For example, young elementary school students who miss an average of just two school days per month often have difficulty keeping up with their peers academically and tend to fall behind in reading. But when students are able to read on grade level by the end of third grade, which is when kids transition from learning to read to reading to learn, they are three to four times more likely to graduate high school and attend college, post-graduate, or professional development classes than their peers who struggle with reading.

We will be rewarding those students with perfect attendance each trimester with an award at the regular

assembly. Perfect attendance means no absences, no tardies, and no early releases. This first trimester that is SCHOOL DAY over 60 students!
